Grass Cutting in the Parks

J.J Enterprises (17 McRae Beach South) is looking after cutting and trimming the grass in both parks as per the following schedule:

In May, June and July the grass will be cut 4 times per month.

In August, September and October 3 times per month.

As many of you are aware, the parks we enjoy belong to the Estate of Thomas McRae. Wanting to keep the deeded right of access to such parks in the hands of those who live or cottage on the original McRae farm, we, as an Association, have agreed to look after the upkeep on such lands.

Parks Cleanup: We need one to two hours of your time in the park closest to your dwelling on June 6th or 7th.at 1:30 pm. Please bring a rake, a shovel, a paper leaf bag, gloves, your muscles and a sense of humour. Together we can make a difference for all to enjoy.

NOTE: long grass indicates debris to be removed. It would be really helpful if all docks could be out of the parks by that time. Thank you.

Other information on Property and Park clean-up:

- 1. According to by-law 2004-0126 section 8.2 [parts a and b], it is illegal to dump anything on Township property. This also applies to the road allowance of 33 feet from the centre of the road on either side of the road along North McRae Beach and South McRae Beach streets. Illegal dumping can be costly. It also has an impact on the aesthetics of our community /neighbourhood. PLEASE REFRAIN FROM DUMPING.
 - **2.** Garbage must be placed in **containers** and 1 (one) bag is removed free of charge. All subsequent bags must have a sticker /tag on each.
 - 3. Open air fires, 4 foot radius or more are only allowed during the day with a fire permit. You must have a 23 foot clearance from any structure, hedge, fence or anything combustible.

Fire permits are available at Baker's Furniture, located on the Road into Pefferlaw. Contained open air burning for cooking and recreational purposes-up to 2 foot radius does not need a permit. Please respect your neighbours. Smoke and odour may be annoying.

GARBAGE DAYS on Duclos Point Rd. and McRae Beach are Mondays.

Garbage Collection is provided every other week. Collectable materials shall be at the curb no earlier than 8:00 p.m. the evening before collection and no later than 7:00 a.m. on the day of collection. The first bag or can does not require a garbage tag. If garbage is set out in a rigid container, and has a tag, please have tag secured to the bag inside container, not attached to the container.

Recycling and Green Bin is picked up weekly. There is no limit to the number of Green Bins or Blue Boxes that can be placed out for collection. To ensure collection, all materials must be out at the curb before 7:00am. For links to information on what items can be recycled please see the link on the McRae Beach website.

<u>Large Articles & White Goods</u> are picked up on the first Friday of the month. Each item must have a garbage tag - white goods are appliances etc. and you must call ahead for pick-up of white goods. 1-800-465-5914

<u>Leaf and Waste</u> Yard Waste Collection is biweekly (Apr. to Nov.) Mondays beginning May and every other week. [exceptions Aug. 8, 17, 31 Sept. 14, 28 Oct. 17 and 28]

Must be put in kraft paper bags, rigid containers or tied up. Paper bags are available at Canadian Tire, Home Hardware, Home Depot, etc.

Do not use plastic bags.

Spring and Fall Tag Exemption Days

Each spring and each fall, the Town of Georgina designates one week as Bag Tag Exemption week to assist in the cleanup around your house. Each household is entitled to set out up to five (5) bags or rigid containers or large articles out at the curb without having to affix garbage tag. This year, the Tag Exemption Days will be:

Spring: May25, 2009, MONDAY

June 1- Canadian Environment Week

Fall: September 14, 2009, MONDAY

OCTOBER 19th, 2009, Waste Reduction Week

Take-Action Tips for Cottaging More Lightly

Practice catch-and-release-elsewhere at the sink

When rinsing fruits and veggies, put a basin below the faucet and recycle the captured water for thirsty plants or sluicing off the deck chairs. Brushing your teeth for two minutes with the tap running loses about 11 litres of water down the drain; a mug of water for brushing and rinsing does the job with much less waste.

Flush less

A toilet dam or displacement device in the tank reduces the amount of water being flushed. The toilet dam is a simple tool that holds back water from the flapper valve. Displacement devices can be DIY – set a full plastic water bottle in the tank (don't use a brick; it can disintegrate, ruining the valves).

Fix the leaky cottage throne

A toilet tank leaking into the bowl adds a lot of water to the septic system. To test for leaks put a few drops of food colouring into the tank. If the colouring appears in the bowl without being flushed, you have a leak.

Kick the lawn habit

About 50 per cent of rainfall rolls right over short manicured grass to the water, carrying with it fertilizers (many are loaded with phosphorus) or pesticides (poisonous to aquatic life). Better to replace a lawn with no-maintenance native plants, such as dogwood and black-eyed Susans, which readily absorb most surface water. If you must be a turfhead, keep the grass more than 30 metres from the shoreline, don't use fertilizers or pesticides, and mow it no shorter than eight centimetres high.

Pick up after your pooch

Yes, there's already wildlife poop around the cottage, but modern CSI-style tracking of pollutants has identified dog-doo as a major source of water pollution in many areas, one that carries coliform bacteria that can make people sick. Bury or toss it in the back forty, or flush it down.

Beware the phantom load

Some electrical devices that use a remote control, like televisions, DVD players, or stereos, or use an adaptor, such as computers, continue to steal power after they're turned off. Unplug these or hook them into a power bar with a switch so you can really turn them off when not in use.

Listen to Charlotte

When sealing up cracks in the cottage, keep an eye out for spider webs. Spiders like to weave them in the path of airflow (a.k.a. air leaks) to catch insects.

Get over that waterweed phobia

Okay, so the kids squeal when they step in the shallows and feel weedy tentacles. Don't strip the entire waterfront of its aquatic vegetation, which holds sediment in place and provides critical food and shelter for many water dwellers, from bass to water striders. Instead, designate a small activity area for swimming, preferably less than two metres wide, and contact your local MNR for a work permit before you remove anyamount of aquatic vegetation. Easier still, put a ladder at the end of your dock and skip the shallows entirely.

WELCOME NEWCOMERS:

We extend a hearty welcome to all who have made McRae Beach their permanent or summer address since the 2008 season. As a reminder to those of us who have been around for some time, and FYI to our new arrivals:

- · Georgina Township requires dogs to be leashed or otherwise restrained at all times
- · parking and camping within our parks are prohibited
- the speed limit on Blue Heron Drive, McRae Beach South and all side streets is 40 km/h
- * the water from the pump in the second park is not potable
- when on/in the water PLAY SAFELY! Swimmers and sailboats always have the right of way
- all docks, boatlifts, etc. are to be out of the parks and in the water, or on your own property by JUNE 30. This will assist the grass cutter to do his job and park users to pursue their enjoyment of this space.
- for safety reasons and the pleasure of all, no vehicles are to be left in the parks. Please park along the road or return your car to your dwelling after launching.
- <u>by law</u>, the first 30 metres (100ish feet) from the shoreline are deemed restricted and as such boats and PWC operators are reminded of the need to keep their speed down to 10 km/hr when entering or exiting this area. Many residents have placed buoys at the 100' mark to assist in identifying the swimming area.
