Free Fire Permits

The Ontario Fire Code (2.6.2.4.) prohibits all open air burning except for small confined cooking fires and other fires that have been "approved" by the Fire Chief. This article describes the policy by which limited open air burning may be permitted.

Open Air Burning Includes

Any fire set outside, other than on a small confined grill, while being used to cook food. Campfires, brush/leaves, burn barrels and construction site fires are examples of open air burning.

Do you know that Open Air Burning requires a permit from the Fire Chief? The fire can't be any larger than 1.2 metres x 1.2 metres x 1.2 metres (4 ft. x 4 ft. x 4 ft). You must have a minimum of 7 metres (23 ft) clearance from any structure, hedge, fence or anything combustible.

You must stay with the fire at all times until it is completely extinguished, and you must provide a means of extinguishment.

<u>Be mindful of your neighbour</u>. You cannot maintain a fire when the direction of the wind may cause either reduced visibility on a roadway or excessive smoke or an odour that may cause discomfort to persons in the immediate area and the fire must be out by sunset.

Obtaining Permission to Burn

Permits for Open Air Burning can be obtained from the Civic Centre or at Station 1-4 in Keswick at 165 The Queensway South, Keswick, 905-476-5167 or Station 1-6 at 37 Snooks Blvd. Sutton, 905-722-8252. Remember, if the Fire department is called and no authorization has been obtained, you are liable to pay costs for the Fire department and/or charged under the Open Air Burning Bylaw, or both. Regardless of authorization, the person that starts the fire is responsible for any effect that fire or smoke may have on neighbouring persons or property.

Poison Ivy

What is it?

Poison ivy is a straggling or climbing woody vine that's well known for its ability to cause an itchy rash. Poison ivy can be found in farm fields surrounding McRae's Beach. It grows and sprouts in thickets, in clearings, and along the borders of woods and roadsides. This glossy perennial can spread by seed or by producing shoots from its extensive underground stems.

Should I be concerned?

All parts of the poison ivy plant, including the roots, contain the poisonous resin 'urushiol'. Contact with any broken part of the plant may cause a reaction. Most people develop symptoms 24 to 48 hours after contact. The extent of a reaction depends on the person's sensitivity and the amount of sap in contact with their skin. The inflamed areas often develop blisters, which leads to intense itchiness.

The rash spreads through exposure to the sap, not from the sores themselves. So a person has to actually come into contact with the sap (not necessarily with the plant) before developing an allergic reaction. Contact with a surface that has picked up sap from the plant (like the fur of an animal) can also result in a reaction.

If poison ivy is burned and the smoke is inhaled, the rash will appear on the lining of the lungs, causing extreme pain

What does poison ivy look like?

The leaves of poison ivy have three pointed leaflets. The middle leaflet has a much longer stalk than the two side ones. The leaflet edges can be smooth or toothed, but are rarely lobed. The leaves vary greatly in size, from 8 to 55 mm in length. They are reddish when they appear in the spring, turn green during the summer, and become various shades of yellow, orange, or red in the fall.

The plant produces clusters of cream to yellow-green flowers during the months of June and July. The berries that appear by September are clustered, round, waxy, and green to yellow in colour. The size of the berries range from 3 to 7 mm in diameter, and they often remain on the low, leafless stems of the plant all winter.

What should I do if I get poison ivy on me?

Wash any areas of your skin you think may have come in contact with poison ivy with soap and cold water. Cold water should be used, because hot water tends to open the pores, increasing the chances of the resin being deeply absorbed into your skin. If soap is not available, vinegar (2 tablespoons in 1 cup of water) or rubbing alcohol (1/2 cup in 1/2 cup of water) can be used.

Perseid Meteor Shower

Just The Facts

Comet of Origin: Swift-Tuttle

Radiates from: constellation Perseus

The Perseid meteor shower is known as one of the best meteor showers to observe, producing fast and bright meteors that frequently leave trails, but in 2014, a nearly full moon will upstage the show.

Go Fly a Kite

Kite Flying is great fun and it's easy if you know some kite secrets. So grab your kite and join in the fun. The sky is big enough for EVERYONE!

The first thing you need to do is pick a kite. Fliers carry different types of kites for different winds. Kite fliers enjoy the different experiences each type offers.

Be sure your kite is put together correctly, or it may not fly.

Deltas, Diamonds and Dragon kites fly well in light to medium winds (approximately 10-25 km/h) while Box Kites and stickless-Parafoil kites fly better when the winds get a little stronger (approximately 13-40 km/h).

General Rules for Picking Kite Days:

Because we don't control the wind, we learn to watch for the right kite flying conditions.

Wind that is too strong or too light is difficult to fly in. A flag or windsock is handy to help you see the wind. About 8-40 km/h is best for most kites (when leaves and bushes start to move, but before it really starts to blow).

Flying is most fun when the wind is medium so you can do more than just hold on. You can make your kite dance across the sky by pulling in and letting out the line.

Flying Space should be a clear, open area. Stay away from roads, power lines or airports. Open fields, parks and beaches are great for flying kites. The more room you have, the more line you can let out.

Remember that as the wind goes over and around trees and buildings, it gets bumpy and difficult to fly kites in. Watch out for kite eating trees!

No Storms: Never fly in rain or lightening. Electricity in clouds is attracted to damp kite lines and foolish kite fliers.

Geographic History of Lake Simcoe

Lake Simcoe was formed by glacial melt water and is southern Ontario's largest interior lake.

It's length is 48 km and width is 29 km, it's maximum depth is 41.5 m. It's east and west sides are eskers (coarse gravel ridges) and shores are drumlin hills formed by a mix of granite, sand and gravel deposits left by the retreating glaciers.

Also left behind were wetlands, swamps and marshes like Holland Marsh and Keswick Marsh that formed in the depressions.

Raised beaches of sand and gravel are all around the lake, most prominent at Barrie.

Legal & Common Sense

We extend a warm welcome to all who have made McRae Beach their permanent or summer address since the 2013 season. As a reminder to those of us who have been around for some time and FYI to our new arrivals:

- Georgina Township requires dogs to be licensed and not run at large at all times.
- Parking and camping within our parks are prohibited.
- Use of our parks is restricted to McRae Beach residents and their guests only.
- When using either of our parks, please take your garbage home.
- The speed limit on Blue Heron Drive, McRae Beach South and all side streets is 40km/h.
- When on/in the water PLAY SAFELY! Swimmers and sailboats always have the right of way.
- All docks, boat lifts, etc. are to be out of the parks and in the water, or on your own property by June 10. This will assist the grass cutter to do his job and park users to pursue their enjoyment of this space.
- For safety reasons and the pleasure of all, no vehicles are to be left in the parks. Please park along the road or return your car to your dwelling after launching.
- The first 30 meters (100ish feet) from the shoreline are deemed restricted and as such boats and PWC operators are reminded of the need to keep their speed down to 10km/h when entering or exiting this area. Many residents have placed buoys at the 100' mark to assist in identifying the swimming area.
- The noise by-law for Georgina is in effect for 24 hours a day. Residents are to regulate their noise as to not disturb surrounding neighbours. If the noise becomes bothersome and/or lasts for several hours, the town by-law officers can be reached Monday to Friday at 705-437-2210 or 905-722-6518.
