Welcome to returning cottagers and also to our Year around residents. The past



A look back on the history of McRae Beach as told by Martha McRae by her father Nick McRae son of Thomas McRae An earlier time when families started buying lots, putting up cottages and enjoying all this area has to offer. A slower pace, trips to the Lovell's store for candy and homemade pies, and knowing your neighbours.



In 1893 Duncan McRae bought the farm that is now known as McRae Beach. After the death of Duncan's second wife, Thomas McRae, his son, bought up her land from her family and he became the full owner of the farm.

In 1945 Thomas began subdividing and selling the lakefront properties up to the 2nd park, which he sold for \$12.00/foot frontage. All were sold within the year.

In 1947 Thomas created a 2^{nd} subdivision from the 2^{nd} park to the end of the road, these also sold out within the year.

The 'off'lake' properties were all divided and gradually sold during these years as well.

South McRae was later divided and mostly sold by Thomas before his death in 1964.

Somewhere in the late 70's early 80's, Nicholson (Nick) McRae, divided and sold the lots that were then a field between the farmhouse and the lake.

Nick McRae still remembers sitting at the kitchen table naming the side streets off what is now Blue Heron.

Laviolette - named after his Mom's maiden name

Ashwood - lots of Ash trees

Vine - so many vines wrapping around the fences

Mellon - unsure.

Blue Heron was originally Park Rd, named for Dr. Park who built what is now the Duggan's cottage. The town changed it to Blue Heron as there already was a Park Rd.

A note of gratitude to the McRae family for offering up the land to be settled , and for allowing us to have two private parks.
